Topic Sticky Knowledge	
Geography	About 1.2 billion people live in India. The capital of India is New Delhi, but the largest city is Mumbai
	India is surrounded by three bodies of water: The Arabian Sea, The Bay of Bengal and the Indian Ocean.
	There are many mountain ranges in India. The most famous of these are the Himalayas.
	The monsoon season in India is the time when the country has the most rain, and it can last from July to September.
	The River Ganges is the longest river in India. It is also considered a holy and special place for many people, including Hindu and Sikh believers.
	The Taj Mahal is a famous Indian landmark that many people from all over the world visit every year. It is a burial place that took 20 years to build.
D&T	Fruits and vegetables are full of vitamins, minerals and fibre. These nutrients help us to grow, heal, give us energy and keep us healthy.
	Chopping: The bridge technique involves making a bridge over the piece of food with the fingers holding one side and the thumb on the other. Then the knife can be inserted under the bridge onto the top of the piece of food and cut safely.
	The claw hold is another safe way to cut food. It involves tucking the tips of the fingers inwards so the knuckles are guiding the blade, not your fingertips.
	Herbs and spices come from different parts of the plant. A herb are leafy green part of a plant. A spice can come from the root, stem, flower, fruit or bark of plant. Some plants can give both a herb and a spice.
Science	Most living things live in a habitat to which they are suited and depend on each other for survival. Animals depend on plants to give them shelter and food. Some animals depend on other animals for food.
	All animals get their food from plants either directly or indirectly by eating an animal that eats plants.

RE	A pilgrimage is a journey to a religious place. It is different to going on holiday. The people who go on these special journeys are called 'pilgrims'.
	Muslims live by the Five Pillars of Islam, which are rules to live a good Muslim life. One of these pillars or rules is going on a pilgrimage to Mecca, in Saudi Arabia.
	This special pilgrimage is called Hajj and takes place every year. Every adult Muslim, who is physically and mentally fit and can afford it, needs to make the pilgrimage at least once in a lifetime.
	Hajj can only be taken in Dhul-Hijjah, the twelfth month of the Muslim calendar.
	Before reaching Mecca, all pilgrims must wash and put on special clothes.
	The pilgrims visit the Ka'bah in Mecca and walk around it seven times anticlockwise to show that their world revolves around Allah. This is called tawaf. Muslims also try to touch the black stone at the bottom of one of the Kab'ah's corners.
	'Classical music' is music that's different from Pop, Jazz, or Folk music. The Classical era in the history of music is when composers such as Haydn, Mozart and Beethoven were active.
Music	Classical music can include music from churches, theatre, ballet, opera and chamber music.
	The rule of thirds is a guideline for taking pictures, the horizon should be one-third or two-thirds of the way up a photograph, with the subject matter placed one-third or two-thirds of the way across.
Computing	Digital photographs are made up of many, many small dots (pixels), each of which can take one of 16 million or so different colours. The colour information is recorded by the camera sensor.
