Topic Sticky Knowledge	
Geography	There are 50 countries in Europe with a total of more than 742 million people living on the continent. Approximately 38 million people live in Poland.
	Most of Poland consists of lowlands within the North European Plain. It stands at almost 2500 metres (8200ft).
	The mountain ranges to the south are called the Carpathians and the Sudetes. Mount Rysy is the highest peak in Poland.
	The two main rivers are the Oder and the Vistula and there are almost 10,000 lakes.
	A famous landmark is the Christ the King statue in western Poland, which stands at around 33 metres (108ft) tall.
Science	Seeds can be dispersed by water, shaking, dropping, carrying, eating and bursting.
	The flower's job is to create seeds so that new plants can be grown.
	The male parts of the flower is called the stamen. The stamen is made up of the anther and the filament. The filament's job is to hold up the anther. The job of the anther is to make the pollen.
	The female parts of the flower are made up of the stigma, style and ovary. The job of the style is to hold up the stigma. The stigma collects the pollen when a pollinator brushes by it. The ovary contains the ovules, which are the part of the flower that gets fertilised and eventually becomes the new seed.
Design & Technology	Our tongue can detect five different tastes: sweet, bitter, sour, salty and umami.
	Bread is a staple food prepared by baking a dough of flour and water. Over 200 different kinds of bread are produced in the UK. Different kinds of flour make different breads, as do adding other ingredients such as egg, herbs, fruit and vegetables.
	Leavening is the process of adding gas to a dough before or during baking to produce bread that is lighter. Bread can be leavened by using chemicals such as baking powder. It can also be leavened with yeast. Bakers follow a process where dough goes through two resting periods called proofing. During this time, the bread rises.
